


National Network of Older People's Councils | Chairperson Elections 2020

The Commission, which will be chaired by Ms Josephine Feehily, will examine sustainability and eligibility issues in respect of State Pension arrangements and will outline options for Government to address issues such as qualifying age, contribution rates, total contributions and eligibility requirements. The membership of the Commission reflects the wide range of expertise and stakeholder representation necessary to examine the complex public and social policy issues involved.  <p>Údarás Náisiúnta Iompair National Transport Authority</p>	<p>BusConnects Dublin - Launch of Third Round of Public Consultation for Core Bus Corridors (Bus Priority & Cycle Lanes/Tracks)</p> <p>On Wednesday, the National Transport Authority (NTA) announced details of the third round of public consultation, of Preferred Route Options for the 16 Core Bus Corridors of BusConnects Dublin. The Core Bus Corridors aims to deliver 230km of bus priority and 200km of cycle lanes/tracks. The consultation period will run from Wednesday 04th November until Wednesday 16th December 2020.</p> <p>A second round of public consultation on the Preferred Route options commenced in March 2020 and continued until mid-April 2020. Due to the</p>

pandemic and Government restrictions, it was decided by the NTA in March that an additional third round of public consultation would take place later in the year to provide further opportunities for the public to review and submit feedback to the latest set of designs.

These proposals are subject to a third non-statutory round of public consultation, and subsequent design refinement and environmental impact assessment, before a formal statutory application will be made by the NTA to An Bord Pleanála for approval during the first quarter of 2021.

Due to the ongoing Covid-19 restrictions, this public consultation will take place using virtual and online facilities. However, potentially impacted property owners will be contacted directly by BusConnects and offered one to one phone calls with design team members.

For the general public there will be a range of public consultation facilities:

- Virtual Public Information Rooms – A virtual information room has been created for each of the 16 Core Bus Corridors. These can be accessed on the website www.busconnects.ie and will remain open for a six-week period. Each virtual room provides details of the Preferred Route Option for each of the corridors including maps and supporting documentation. There is also an Audio option available for the virtual information room.
- Website – Updated versions of the 16 Core Bus Corridor Brochures as well as additional supporting documentation are available to view and download on www.busconnects.ie. The brochures are also available in HTML, PDF and Audio versions on the website.
- Community Forums – The NTA is fully committed to working with all interested parties in the development of the Core Bus Corridors Project. They want to keep everyone on the proposed bus corridors fully in the picture at all times. As such, Community Forums have been established for each corridor. The aim is to create a two-way communication with local communities allowing information and feedback to be relayed clearly, quickly and accurately. There will be an online webinar for Community Forum meetings via Zoom. Community Forum members will receive an email a week in advance of their meeting with a link to register. Membership of each forum comprises of a single representative from resident and community associations, disability and special interest groups and business organisations on the corridors, along with local public representatives. As places are limited, only one representative per group can be accepted. Queries can be sent to cbc@busconnects.ie

Some of you may know that the mobile phone networks have committed themselves to giving affordable unlimited mobile data packages to anyone who is studying at the moment. Many students working remotely are stretching their mobile data to its limit and beyond. Ireland's National Adult Learning Organisation AONTAS has produced an [accessible guide](#) showing how to avail of this facility. Given the recent nationwide level 5 restrictions Announced, mobile providers have confirmed they will continue to provide learners with affordable unlimited mobile data packages during this time. Conversations in Portrait in Roscommon

Roscommon, Sligo, Leitrim and Donegal Local Authorities are engaging with sixteen people this Autumn for a Creative Ireland Creativity in Older Age Virtual Portrait Project. A call went out for people in each county, over age 70 in a nursing home or cocooning at home, missing their cultural activities and interested in making new connections at this time. Over three zoom sessions, artist Andy Parsons will paint their portrait, while talking and getting to know each person and how they have responded to the last few months of Covid. In return for their time, the art will be delivered to the sitters who will hang it in their home and invite a small number of close family, friends and staff to view the portrait, depending on Covid restrictions at the time.

Pictured here are Maisie & Noel from County Roscommon.



Maisie was the first of the four Roscommon portraits, a 97-year-old lady who resides in Sonas Nursing Home Cloverhill. During the Covid-19 pandemic, Maisie has consistently kept up to date on all the news, maintaining a positive outlook on the situation, all the time maintaining her faith, and praying for better times to come. Artist Andy Parsons

described her as a truly inspirational lady. The portrait now has pride of place on Maisie's wall.



The next portrait has been recently delivered to Noel Higgins, Boyle. Noel has had to cocoon since March following a quadruple bi pass and a broken back and has still managed to stay positive throughout all. Noel is delighted with his portrait and really enjoyed the process.

Portraits will be exhibited on the Local Authority and Age & Opportunity's Bealtaine Festival websites and Facebook pages at the end of 2020 and in a touring exhibition as part of Bealtaine Festival 2021. The initiative has been managed by Roscommon Arts Office together with artist Andy Parsons, and is a partnership project by Roscommon, Sligo, Leitrim and Donegal Local Authorities and Age & Opportunity as part of the Creative Ireland Creativity in Older Age.

Perhaps keep a **daily diary** to record the people you are in contact with every day, so if you develop symptoms it will be easier to trace them

Coronavirus COVID-19

If you have fever and/or cough you should stay at home regardless of your travel or contact history.

How to Prevent

- Wash:** your hands well and often to avoid contamination.
- Cover:** your mouth and nose with a tissue or elbow when coughing or sneezing and dispose used tissue.
- Avoid:** touching eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands.
- Clean:** avoid contact frequently touched objects and surfaces.
- Stop:** shaking hands or hugging others. Taking lifts or greeting other people.
- Distance:** avoid close contact with other people, especially those who might be unwell.

All people are advised to:

- > Reduce social interactions
- > **Keep a distance** of 2m between you and other people
- > **Do not** shake hands or make close contact where possible
