Janssen vaccine available from some pharmacies

Many pharmacies are now offering the Janssen single-dose COVID-19 vaccine to people aged 50 or over who have not been vaccinated yet. Find a pharmacy to [book your vaccine appointment here](#).

AstraZeneca vaccine second dose

The AstraZeneca vaccine is a two-dose vaccine. Please attend for your second AstraZeneca dose when invited. This gives increased and longer lasting protection against COVID-19 including the Delta variant now circulating widely in the UK. Anyone who received a first dose of AstraZeneca vaccine should get their second dose 8 to 12 weeks after the first dose. If more than 12 weeks has passed since your first dose and you have not received your second dose, you can phone HSELive on 1800 700 700. You can [read more here](#).

A Message from An Garda Síochána | Crime Prevention Unit

Numerous reports of yet another phone scam involving what appear to be Irish mobile numbers (many different ones) where the scammer rings the person and an automated recording tells them that they are ringing from An Garda Síochána and their PPS number has been suspended. This is a scam. DO NOT ENGAGE, END CALL IMMEDIATELY.

Fraud Prevention Advice - Automated Phone Calls concerning PPS Numbers

Gardaí are urging the public to spread the word of fraud prevention as people continue to fall victim to scams on a daily basis.

In recent days Gardaí have received reports in relating to automated scam phone calls. The recipient is called and advised via a recorded message that An Garda Síochána is investigating them in relation to suspicious activity linked to their PPS number. In order to rectify the situation, the recipient is then advised to press a number to speak to someone further in relation to the matter. These scam calls are mainly coming from numbers with the most Irish mobile prefixes.

On receipt of these communications, the advice of An Garda Síochána is as follows:

- Do not engage with the caller.
- Do not return the call.
- Do not follow the automated instructions – Do not press 1 etc.
- Never disclose personal or financial information.
- Hang up and block the number if possible.

Whilst the scammers may change their stories and methods, their goal is always the same – they want to access your sensitive information and get their hands on your money. If you believe you may have fallen victim to this scam, contact your financial institution and report the matter to local Gardaí.

Dementia Understand Together were delighted to see all the transport providers represented at their recent Symposium. Hearing the lived experience from members of the Irish Dementia Working group on travelling with dementia and seeing the presentations from the national perspective, the 2019 research findings, the practical workshop experience with Irish Rail and the experience from Scotland have given helpful insights into the barriers and enablers to travel.

In addition to that, the conversations highlighted how COVID-19 may have impacted on a person's confidence to travel again when restrictions are lifted further, and which actions can support a person with dementia to continue to take their journeys.

Leitrim's Lockdown Legends are uplifting, positive, entertaining and motivating and are produced over 4 episodes.

1. Mary Flynn who lives in Drumkeerin reared 10 children with her late husband. Over the years her many health issues failed to dampen her spirits and Lockdown wasn't going to do it either.
2. Frances O'Reilly from Enniskillen met her husband Chris, at a Sunday night dance in Belturbet, Co Cavan. Their daughter, who lives beside them, with husband and 2 children, has a heart issue and for 15 months, they never came into granny's house. Frances' account of how their daughter and grandchildren came in for a cup of tea after 15months of lockdown is really moving.
3. Mai & Willie Joe Farrell were fond of playing cards and bingo and visiting their children and grandchildren abroad. It all came to a sudden end and Willie Joe found himself getting into a canoe for the first time in his life while Mai buried herself in books and baking.

4. Patsy Guckian and his wife Nancy love their traditional Irish music but failing health prevented them from their weekly visits to Cryan's Teach Ceol long before Lockdown did. With the help of his niece and nephew he got back there last December and it's an evening which will stay with him forever.

Perhaps keep a **daily diary** to record the people you are in contact with every day, so if you develop symptoms it will be easier to trace them

Coronavirus COVID-19

If you have fever and/or cough you should stay at home regardless of your travel or contact history.

How to Prevent

- Wash:** Wash your hands well and often to avoid contamination.
- Cover:** Cover your mouth and nose with tissue or elbow when coughing or sneezing, and discard used tissue.
- Avoid:** Avoid touching eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands.
- Clean:** Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.
- Stop:** Stop shaking hands, hugging, kissing, saying hello to, or greeting other people.
- Distance:** Stay at least 2 metres (6 feet) away from other people, especially those who might be sick.

All people are advised to:

- > **Reduce** social interactions
- > **Keep a distance** of 2m between you and other people
- > **Do not** shake hands or make close contact where possible

Symptoms: > Fever (High Temperature) > A Cough > Shortness of Breath > Breathing Difficulties
