Minister Humphreys awards Age Friendly Recognition Charters to Public Libraries across Ireland











- All Public Library Services receive their Charter
- Minister Humphreys: 'This is about the provision of enhanced library services for older citizens'
- The charters recognise the progress made by public libraries in meeting the diverse needs of older Persons'

The Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, on Friday 16th February 2024, awarded Age Friendly Recognition Charters to Ireland's public libraries. The award event took place in Edgeworthstown library, County Longford, one of Ireland's newest public libraries.

The Age Friendly Recognition Charter recognises the commitment made by the public library service in developing enhanced services for older citizens if their communities. Public libraries have reviewed their collections plus events programmes along with their facilities and services to identify improvements to meet older person's needs.

Awarding the Recognition Charters on the day, Minister Humphreys said:

"I am delighted to be here today to recognise the superb work of our public libraries in developing enhanced services for ageing communities and to award the Age Friendly Recognition Charters to our library services.





"Libraries are a core service within our neighbourhoods, and they are particularly invaluable to older people as a source of information, and as community hubs, learning centres and cultural facilities. The Age Friendly Library Recognition Programme supports libraries to examine their facilities and services and to listen to older customers. Library staff across the country go above and beyond to create welcoming, accessible, and relevant services for older people and people who have diverse and changing needs."

Catherine McGuigan, Chief Officer, Age Friendly Ireland welcomed the awards, stating:

"Today's awards are a further step towards the vision of an age friendly Ireland. Age Friendly Libraries are vibrant, welcoming, diverse settings with an array of supports and services that enable older people to visit, learn and be part of the fabric of their communities. I thank the Minister for Rural and Community Development, Libraries Ireland and our network of Age Friendly Library Champions across the country who have facilitated this recognition process and achievement."

There were several examples given at the event of the measures implemented by age-friendly public libraries, including:

- Walkability audits of the buildings
- Age Friendly Parking
- Adapted trollies for customers to transport heavy books to the counter
- Meeting spaces for older people's groups
- Accessibility improvements such as automatic doors
- Seating that is suitable for older people, and accessible shelving so books are at eye levels
- Provision of digital training and digital equipment loans
- Outreach services to library members' homes



Technical Programmes - Age Friendly Ireland Housing Case Study



Cornamona Court on Kylemore Road, Ballyfermot, Dublin, was recently awarded with the Age Friendly Housing Award for 2023. This award recognises housing initiatives that enable older people to remain independent for as long as possible.



Well done to Dublin City Council and the Project Team on the delivery of this outstanding Age Friendly development. Cornamona Court, which was delivered in 2023 by Dublin City Council, provides 61 intergenerational social homes, a mix of houses and duplexes for families and older persons' homes. The older person apartments incorporate universal design and Age Friendly design features which will enable independent living.

Award for Most Inclusive Project, A Vision for "Gold Star" Beach Accessibility



Receiving the Award for Most Inclusive Project, A Vision for "Gold Star" Beach Accessibility, Donegal County Council was delighted to win the 'Most Inclusive Project' 2024 award at the LAMA all Ireland Community & Council awards ceremony held in Dublin on February 17th, 2024. This recognition stands as a testament to the dedication and innovation put forth by the council in creating accessible beach environments for all.

The objective of this project is not only to overcome physical barriers but also to foster a sense of inclusivity and belonging for individuals of all ages and abilities. In







line with this commitment, Donegal is actively pursuing Ireland's first Age Friendly beach at Narin Portnoo, recognising the needs and preferences of older people.



The Masterplan for beach accessibility incorporates a comprehensive approach, aiming to establish enhanced opportunities for everybody to enjoy the beauty of Donegal's beaches. This initiative has received glowing testimonials from older individuals who have experienced first-hand the transformative impact of improved accessibility.



"I never thought I'd be able to enjoy the beach to this extent, but thanks to the accessibility improvements and equipment, I can now take leisurely strolls and pause for rests along the shore" remarked one local resident.

As part of the ongoing efforts to make beaches more Age-Friendly, Donegal has implemented infrastructural improvements such as installing boardwalks, beach mats, seating areas, and viewpoints, catering to the comfort and convenience of older visitors. Additionally, the provision of 15 beach







wheelchairs and Age-Friendly mobility walkers ensures that individuals with mobility challenges can fully participate in beach activities. The initiative also includes provision of 'Changing Place' facilities at select beach locations, catering for individuals with higher level of need.

The success of this project extends beyond physical enhancements; it has sparked increased community engagement and empowered communities to develop their accessibility plans, using the established template as a guide. Local businesses have rallied behind these efforts, offering financial assistance and implementing accessibility improvements.

Accessibility audits of five blue flag beaches, funded by Donegal County Council's Sláintecare Healthy Communities Programme, have been a significant part of this process. They provide a roadmap for short, medium, and long-term actions. These audits serve as a template for identifying and addressing accessibility barriers across all beaches in the county.



Age Friendly Louth Accessibility Audit in Drogheda





Members of Louth Older People's Council, service users from the Irish Wheel Chair Association and members of the public were invited to take part in an accessibility audit along a portion of the Dublin Rd, Drogheda on 26.02.2024.

The audit was conducted long a section of the R132 from the pedestrian lights located at the entrance to the Train Station along the R132 to the pedestrian lights located beside Scotch Hall, along both sides of the road.

This section of the R132 is a particularly busy part of the road with large volumes of cars, buses, HGV lorries, bikes, e scooters and pedestrians using the road on a regular basis.









Participants were looking at the physical built environment, including footpaths, roads signage, street furniture and also environmental conditions.

Participants were commenting on the experience of navigating this section of road from the point of view of an older pedestrian or an individual with mobility issues.

Following the walkability audit participants

held a debriefing session and discussed their findings and observations.



All comments and observations will be collated into a report and presented to Trinity College Dublin (TCD) as part of their project on Nursing Homes Across Ireland, copies of the report will also be presented to Louth County Council & presented as a submission to the Joint Local Area Plan for Drogheda.








Meath Alzheimer Café

Clare Island





The sun shone yesterday, the 26th February, on Clare Island for the introduction of the Activator Walking with poles programme to the Island. The programme is brought to the Island by Age Friendly Mayo and Mayo Sports Partnership.

This project is funded by HSE as part of the Government of Ireland's Our Living Islands National Islands Policy 20232033 which

aims to ensure Ireland's offshore islands continue to support sustainable and vibrant communities, a key objective is to enhance health & wellbeing services. The programme is free for all to attend but has specific focus for those:



- with balance concerns or mobility issues.
- with conditions such as arthritis, Parkinson's Disease, multiple sclerosis, etc. recovering from hip/knee surgery.





Research suggests regular use of walking poles can improve posture and gait, reduce joint impact (especially ankles, knees and hips), develop range of motion of the shoulders and spine, increase muscle strength in the upper body (especially arms and core) and enhance stability and reduce fear of falling. Evidence also suggests poles also improve pain management. This project aims to evaluate the potential of ACTIVATOR Poles to

- increase activity levels.
- improve health, functional fitness, and physical independence.

There has been significant and sustained interest in and take-up of Activator Poles in the past three years particularly among older adults and people with balance concerns or mobility issues.





The Activator Walking with Poles programme has already been set up in over 20 areas in Mayo.

The 6-week, 1 hour programme, is suitable to all levels of fitness – each week the tutor will assist participants with use of the activator poles to increase strength and improve mobility. The course runs each Monday morning from 10 to 11 from Community Centre.
